Blatz wants to convert a red-and-white combination cow shelter and bunk house — located on his 160-acre farm — into a club offering food and drink.

But he must get past the Scott County Planning Advisory Commission, scheduled to take up the issue Jan. 22, and the Scott County Board.

Feelings appear divided on the issue. Five planning commission members say they are undecided and a sixth, Daniel T. Stack, says he has an opinion but won't make it public.

Albert Feldman Sr., Credit River Town Board chairman, says he doesn't want the supper club. Feldman recalled that he was run off the road 15 years ago by a drunk driver.

Thursday night, the Savage Village Council instructed the village's attorney, Daniel O'Connell, to send a letter opposing the supper club to the Scott County Planning Commission.

Councilmen in Savage, which borders on Credit River, were con-

cerned about a commercial establishment in a residential area, inadequate roads to handle increased traffic the club would generate and possible pollution of the Credit River, said O'Connell.

O'Connell said he mailed the letter yesterday.

Estimates are that Credit River's population grew from 439 in 1960 to 1,165 in 1970. Town Clerk Joseph Skluzacek says the township has four businesses.
